Culture Program

- Supports children, youth and families on their healing journeys.
- Provides individual and group activities.
- Provides safe learning spaces to explore culture, traditions, teachings, and ceremonies.
- Respects all spiritual paths in our shared territory sharing good medicine.
- We honour all spiritual paths and share our Anishinabek ways for guidance.

Our cultural programming is a paramount anchor of NCFS services. Our Culture staff work with all departments to assist in creating and delivering support programs tailored to children, youth, and families' situations and desired outcomes.

Elder's Advisory Circle

Our Elder's Advisory Circle is made up of Elders from all member communities. They are a compass resource to assist staff in the steering, development, and delivery of services. They provide spiritual guidance and support, develop protocols and policies guided by the 7 Gifts, and Clan System. The Elders work closely with the Culture Team to develop future activities to positively affect children, youth and families.


